



From The Rector

In the centennial history of Grace Church, written in 1929, the authors note with great pride that when the new parish house was completed in 1912, eight different parish groups could meet simultaneously. Today, a parishioner of Grace Church might ask, "where are those eight meeting rooms?" Well, a few are still used by us and some are rented out, but to get to any of them, you need to walk up (or down) stairs. A hundred years ago, architects simply didn't think about issues of accessibility. A building that was planned with such excitement to meet the needs of a 20th-century church is now 100 years old and is still meeting the needs of a 20th-century church. The problem is, of course, that we are now a 21st-century church. Our parish hall is below ground, windowless and accessed only by walking down multiple flights of stairs. Our kitchen does not meet city codes for being able to cook for public events (we can use it for internal parish events). We have no Sunday School rooms and only one bathroom that's accessible for disabled persons. The only space that can be accessed without going up or down stairs is the church (and the aforementioned bathroom) itself.

At its June meeting, the vestry approved the creation of a working committee to study the space needs of Grace Church in this new century and look at options for better meeting those needs. What ministries do we do here that we could be doing better if we had different space? What new ministries (including outreach to the Providence community) could we be doing that simply aren't feasible in our current buildings? If we hope to grow in this century and draw in individuals and families to join our parish, it will be crucial to have safe, clean, accessible and attractive spaces for all sorts of activities, such as meals, Bible studies, Sunday School, and meetings of various parish groups and ministries. In the coming weeks, this new working committee will begin talking with the different ministries of the parish as well as holding open forums to hear the thoughts and dreams of the parishioners of Grace Church.

Grace Church was designed by the great architect Richard Upjohn and built in 1846 with the needs of a 19th-century church in mind. We still love worshipping in that church and hope to do so for generations yet to come! The chancel and parish house were designed by the great architect Ralph Cram and opened in 1912 with the needs of a 20th-century church in mind. We still love that chancel, and the choir members sing their hearts out every Sunday in that glorious space. We now hope to build for our own century, maintaining our beautiful and historic architecture while creating meeting spaces (and kitchen, bathrooms, etc.) that will serve our needs today.

Financial Report_

Through the first six months of the year, our income and expenses show some encouraging trends.

Most importantly, pledge income through June 30 has exceeded projections by \$16,000 and is up \$20,000 from last year at the same time. Some of this appears to be a shift by some parishioners to make a financial pledge rather than making non-pledged contributions, since the weekly plate offering is about \$10,000 less than last year, but overall "plate and pledge" income has increased by \$10,000 from 2011.

Additionally, thanks to budget reductions announced at the 2012 Annual Meeting and careful monitoring of expenses by staff, vestry and other volunteer leaders, our deficit through June 30 is \$18,820, about \$16,000 less than anticipated.

James Poder, senior warden, says parish leaders and other members can help us continue these encouraging trends by taking several actions:

• Continue to pay pledges in full and on time

- Contribute to the cost of altar flowers (see the schedule in the back of the church)
- Minimize expenses for any projects in which you're involved

General Convention

The Episcopal Church completed its 2012 General Convention in mid July, with delegates taking several actions of note. You can read details about what happened at Convention at the Episcopal News Service site: http://episcopaldigitalnetwork.com/ens

One of the most significant actions calls on the Episcopal Church to "re-imagine its structure" for the 21st century. The legislation creates a special task force of up to 24 people who will gather ideas in the next two years from all levels of the church about possible reforms to its structures, governance and administration. Its work will culminate in a special gathering of people from every diocese to hear what recommendations the task force plans to make to the 78th General Conven-

tion. Its final report is due by November 2014.

Another important action authorized a provisional liturgy for the blessing of same-sex relationships. The deputation from the Diocese of Rhode Island and Bishop Wolf voted unanimously in support of this action.

The liturgy will not be authorized for use until the first Sunday in Advent 2012 (December 2), meaning that implementation will be at the direction of Bishop Knisely (who will be ordained November 17), in consultation with others.

The diocesan blog notes that Bishop-Elect Knisely reminds Rhode Island Episcopalians of Roger Williams's legacy of religious tolerance. He said "How do we live into a world where people disagree? We are Episcopalians. We understand and fully expect that we won't agree. That would be a 'pure' church – and we have historically rejected that understanding of how to live as God's people in the world. We find our unity in common prayer."

In the time between now and December 2, the bishop-elect will be working with diocesan bodies to craft a process of mutual discernment between parishes, clergy, and congregations for whom offering a blessing liturgy would be appropriate in their context.
