

From The Rector

"...so that a people yet unborn may praise the Lord."

As the Church, we are called to live in the present while building for the future. At Grace Church this fall, we're doing just that. Through our 3rd Build Committee, commissioned by the vestry, we will be working this fall to determine what our space needs are here at Grace. We'll be talking with the leaders of our various parish ministries to hear their thoughts on what could benefit their own ministries as well as providing opportunities for the parish at large to share their thoughts and wishes. This will not be a quick process. It will be a marathon rather than a sprint. We're confident, however, that through this process of listening, discernment, and long-term planning, we will be able to create meeting space here at Grace that will allow us to be a vibrant and faithful church well into our 3rd century, so that (to paraphrase from Psalm 102), the people of our city and region who are yet to be born may grow in Christ and praise his name.

While that important work is going on, though, we're also living our lives and our faith right here, right now. In fact, after the 10 a.m. service on Sunday, September 16th, we will have a "Fall Kick-Off" in our parking lot (not exactly bucolic, but extremely convenient!), featuring good food and a chance to learn about and get involved in the various ministries of our diverse parish. The 20s/30s Group has a barbecue on September 8th. The parish choir returns on the 9th. The midweek Eucharist resumes at noon on Wednesday, September 12th. Sunday School registration takes place on September 9th and 16th, and Sunday School itself kicks off on the 23rd. The Sunday Forum resumes at 9 a.m. on the 16th in the Chafee Room with a series on the Holy Eucharist. You get the picture.

In addition to the new beginnings here at our parish, our diocese starts a new chapter this month with the arrival of our Bishop-elect, Nicholas Knisely. He and Bishop Wolf will overlap for two months, and then Bishop-Elect Knisely will formally take over from her on November 17th at his ordination. Our diocese will bid farewell to Bishop Wolf at a reception in her honor on the 23rd of this month (see announcement on page 2.)

I hope you all find many ways to engage in the life of our parish this fall. Please let me know if I can be of any help in that process. That is, quite literally, why I'm here!

Parish Profile: Susan Isett Olson____

When Sue Olson was in grade school at age 7, she rode on the school bus with an armed American guard. It was in the city of Kitzingen, Germany, in 1948, subsequent to the Nazi surrender. Sue's father, a Tank Corps Lieutenant in the 2nd Armored Division who had fought in the Battle of the Bulge, returned home in 1945 only to be ordered to Germany as part of the American occupation force. Susan, born in 1941 in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, as the daughter of a career officer, became an "army child." Her father was continuously being moved from post to post, and Kitzingen was the first of many assignments.

The German citizens, however, had not welcomed the Americans with open arms. The city of Kitzingen was in ruins. No buildings were intact, and the ever present smell of decay, the total lack of sanitary facilities, and the sight of blood stains everywhere were constant reminders of the earlier chaos. Nothing had been done, and the sense of still unaccepted defeat and hate for the conqueror was evident in the attitude of the survivors. Sue recalls being bumped and deliberately pushed. She saw people picking up bits of discarded food and cigarette butts dropped by the Americans. This was at a time before the Marshall Plan, which came into force in late 1948, and during the Nuremberg Trials of Nazi war criminals.

However, by 1953 when the family left Germany and returned to the States, Susan says a railroad line was operating and farms and market places had begun to appear. "As a child, the slowly developing transition for me was a great eye opener," says Susan.

Sue finished junior high school plus her first year of high school in Boulder, Colorado, while her father, now a Colonel, was stationed there. Sue later completed her high school education in Jacksonville, Florida, and attended Florida State University in Tallahassee for a period. It was at the time of the first integration march and other civil rights demonstrations in Tallahassee.

At the end of 1959, Sue's father was sent to Germany once again, this time to Munich, and Sue says she was again shocked to see the

progress in rebuilding which the Germans had made in only six short years.

Sue came home again and attended the University of Maryland in Baltimore for one year, returning to Germany for holidays with her parents where she met her now exhusband, a U.S. Army physician. They had four children together: Stacey, Victoria, Kelly and Mathew.

In pursuit of culture, Sue attended classes offered at the Minneapolis Atelier Studio Program of Fine Art in Minnesota and did some stone sculpture at Minnetonka Art Center in Wazzeta, Minnesota. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Social Work at the University of Minnesota and her

Master of Science in Psychology at St. Mary's University, Minnesota.

Today, Susan enjoys her family, her church, and her drawing and sculpture. At Grace, Sue is relatively new, having come to us from St. Stephen's Church on the east side. She had been visiting Grace Church and said she noticed the mix and beauty of the people. "I was especially impressed with the congregational response and on seeing the sharing of the service between the Rector and Bishop Wolf on a recent Sunday of the Bishop's visit." Sue participates in the Church's Saturday Sandwich Brigade in February and comes to the Sunday Forum.
