Spotlight on Grace: Thank You, Champ!

After more than a quarter of a century on the staff of Grace Church, Meredith "Champ" Cooley is retiring next month. We will celebrate his ministry here at Grace at the 10 a.m. service on Sunday, June 25th.

Our Facilities Manager since the early 1990's, Champ has spent decades maintaining, cleaning, and repairing the "antique," and often complicated, building systems here in this church that we call home. You don't have to walk far on this campus to find equipment or systems that Champ designed and installed.

Champ and his wife, Gail, were married here at Grace by the Rev. Bob Brooks just prior to Bob's retirement, and he and Gail worship here at Grace as well. As some of you know, Champ and Gail have, for years, spent their summers at a campground in Connecticut, but we hope to see them both here on Sundays again in the fall!

In keeping with church practice for the retirement of long-serving staff members, we will be taking up a "purse" for Champ, in thanksgiving for his many years of service to Grace. The campaign has been initiated by Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, who said, "I cannot remember in my life anything I've been involved in where I sensed so clearly the work of the Spirit."

Ascension Day

The Feast of the Ascension of Jesus Christ is celebrated 40 days after Easter Day, marking the conclusion of Jesus' post-resurrection appearances and his ascension into heaven. Although Ascension Day occurred on May 25 on this year's liturgical calendar, many parishes will observe it the following Sunday.

Celebration of this holy day dates back at least to the late fourth century, and scriptural references to Jesus' ascension occur in both The Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel of Mark:

"So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven'" (Acts 1: 6-11, NRSV).

"So then the Lord Jesus, after he had spoken to them, was taken up into heaven and sat down at the right hand of God" (Mark 16:19, NRSV).

The Ascension of Jesus is also professed in the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed: "He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father" (Book of Common Prayer, pp.120, 358).


