

Spotlight on Grace: Ask Those Transforming Questions

Can you question your faith? We'll do it this year in Small Groups. Yes, you can question your faith - and you should! "Whether we are new Christians or long-time Christians, wrestling with our faith is part of the journey," say the Rev. Scott Gunn and the Rev. Melody Wilson Shobe, authors of a study series called *Transforming Questions*. They continue, "If we don't have big questions, it's usually because we are not taking our faith seriously. Or perhaps we are not taking our brain seriously."

Small Groups at Grace will use Transforming Questions this year for their study and discussion. The course consists of 10 sessions - five this fall and five more in the late winter-early spring.



We will wrestle with some of the most basic questions of our faith:

- Why did Jesus have to die?
- Does God answer prayer?
- Why do bad things happen?
- Where do we go when we die?



Come and learn more at our Small Groups Kickoff after the 10 o'clock service Sunday, October 23! You can enjoy coffee and refreshments in the Chafee Room while you hear a brief overview of the course. Sign-up sheets will be available that day and Sunday, October 30. Groups will begin meeting on Friday evening, November 4. (Some groups may use a different schedule if it fits their needs better - we're in favor of flexibility!)

This exciting adult formation course is designed to help both new Christians and long-time

churchgoers move into a deeper life in Christ. Over the course of the 10 sessions, participants will engage the basic questions of the Christian faith through a combination of teaching and conversation. We will gather to share a meal, then a leader will give a presentation about a central question of faith. Participants are invited into deeper reflection on and engagement with the topic through discussion questions.

If you have questions about your faith - and would like a chance to wrestle with them within a community of Christian friends - consider being part of Small Groups at Grace this year. Even if you're just curious, come and see what's in store for you. Your clergy are excited about this offering, and we hope you will be too!



Stewardship 2017: Living Generously


H aven't we all been told that perseverance, along with resilience, are the keys to adult success?

In Luke's gospel this coming Sunday we will see perseverance in action as the determined woman, most probably at an extreme social and economic disadvantage from the judge, perseveres until she wears him down and receives justice and compensation for her grievance. Probably a minor miracle in that biblical setting!

So, could this woman's perseverance teach us something not only about justice, but also about our understanding of stewardship?



One of the most valuable lessons I have learned over the years is that to be successful as a



steward, I need to persevere as I approach charitable giving, just as I need to persevere in the many other facets of my life.

If I am serious about my religious stewardship, it's helpful to remember this woman and the judge. Taking one stab at my annual pledge amount, or makin g a pledge to begin proportional giving, won't get me to the goal of being generous with the gifts God has given me unless I stick with the goal I have set and persevere when I encounter hardship and difficulty in reaching that goal.

Jesus tells us it is important to persevere and that spiritual rewards await those who are consistent and constant in their relationship to God. What that tells me is that God will indeed help me reach my spiritual goals if I commit myself to persevering when the going gets tough.... As I know it will.

Reflection Questions:

Think of a time you pledged time or money to the church. Were there obstacles that got in the way of your commitment?

How did you react to those obstacles? Did you persevere in fulfilling the promise(s) you had made? If not, does that make it harder for you now to pledge time or talent or treasure?







From Scott Gunn of Forward Movement: A Season of Prayer for an Election

Dear friends in Christ,

Investing in Our Children

This week, I am writing with a request. I hope you will join Forward Movement and me in a season of prayer for the upcoming election.



In the United States, we are in the midst of a contentious election season. Potential voters are discerning how to vote, but observers inside and outside the country are also watching the candidates closely. Opinions are sharply divided. What kind of leaders do we need? What is the best way forward for our nation? Indeed, what are the challenges we must solve together?

I've heard people say, again and again, "I'm not sure what to do." For Christians, there is

always one thing we can do, every one of us. We can pray. We can pray for wisdom, for grace, for patience, for courage, for hope. We can and must pray for those with whom we disagree. Whatever else we do, we must pray. We might use our own words, or we might like some language to give voice to our concerns and hopes. We Anglicans are blessed with riches of common prayer.

Forward Movement is calling Episcopalians and all others to join with us in A Season of Prayer: For an Election. This is a 30-day season, in which we will pray each day with a particular intention for this time in our national life. Each day includes a suggested intention and a collect. We also suggest the use of a brief litany every day. The season of prayer begins Sunday, October 9, and continues through the day after the election. We have used prayers from The Book of Common Prayer.

You also can download weekly bulletin inserts or a list of all the prayers at www.forwardmovement.org/election. The resources are available in English or Spanish. Please encourage your congregation and your friends to get involved.

At a time when nearly everyone agrees that we are being consumed by fear and division, here is a chance to change the conversation. While we will certainly differ in our politics, we can surely join together in prayer. I hope you will join in this season of prayer. God knows, our country, our leaders, those who seek public office, and those who are voting need all the help we can get. Let us pray.
