

Spotlight on Grace: A Message from the Rector



In his address at the annual National Prayer Breakfast yesterday, the president said, "I will get rid of and totally destroy the Johnson Amendment and allow our representatives of faith to speak freely and without fear of retribution."

What the heck is the Johnson Amendment, you ask? It's a law dating to 1954 (named for then-Senator Lyndon Johnson) saying that churches and other tax-exempt charities are prohibited from

endorsing political candidates. Most of us have not spent a lot of time thinking about the Johnson Amendment over the years, but the fact that it's gaining prominence now may cause us to reflect (if we haven't already) on the role churches should play in the political realm. To be clear, the Johnson Amendment relates only to the endorsing of specific candidates. Churches are, and always have been, totally within their rights to advocate for various causes, such as welcoming refugees into our country. In fact, our own bishop and other faith leaders

in Rhode Island <u>signed an open letter</u> last week calling on government leaders to "demonstrate moral leadership and affirm their support for the resettlement of refugees from all over the world to the United States." Of course, other faith leaders would be within their rights to call for the polar opposite!

In his Second Inaugural Address,

Abraham Lincoln spoke of the great issue of his day and the bafflement that Christians who opposed slavery felt towards those who supported it: "Both



read the same Bible and pray to the same God, and each invokes His aid against the other. It may seem strange that any men should dare to ask a just God's assistance in wringing their bread from the sweat of other men's faces, but let us judge not, that we be not judged." As Americans, we are free to advocate however we are so moved. As Christians, we are called on by Jesus to advocate for and care for those in need. Just as anti-slavery Christians had a hard time understanding the religious rationales of pro-slavery Christians in the 1860s, we should follow Lincoln's example of advocating for and fighting for our beliefs while trying not to judge or condemn others. No one can claim that President Lincoln shied away from the great moral cause of his day, indeed, he paid for that commitment with his own life. And yet, in his last, great speech, he called on Americans not to judge each other, and perhaps, by extension, to seek to understand each other.

We can and should do everything in our power to speak out for just causes and condemn unjust actions. As any constitutional lawyer can tell you, we don't need to get rid of the Johnson Amendment to do that. And as we seek justice, let us also seek understanding. They are not mutually exclusive. In fact, they are both spiritually necessary.
