Rector's Letter

Friends,

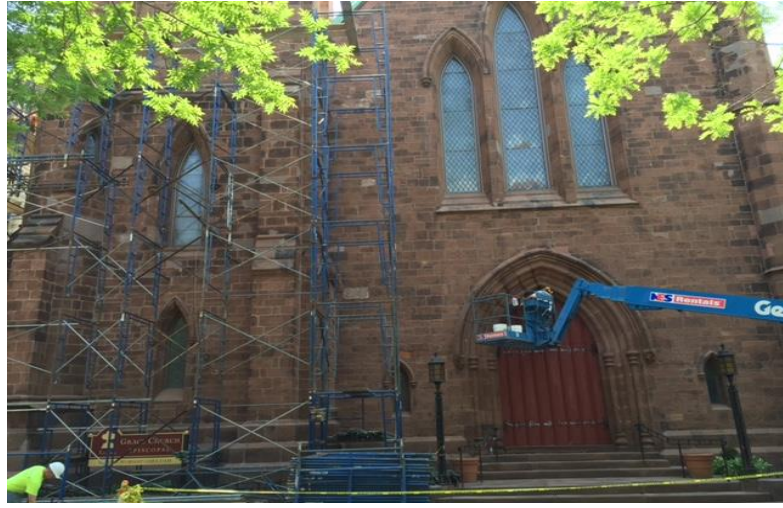
This is one of those years when Pentecost and Memorial Day overlap. Because Pentecost is a moveable feast (meaning it falls on different dates in different years) there's nothing intentional about the Pentecost/Memorial Day overlap, but it has caused me to wonder this year if there is something of Pentecost in Memorial Day.

Pentecost was the day on which the Holy Spirit descended on and galvanized the apostles to go out into the world and do the work of God. Many of them lost their lives in that sacred but dangerous work all those years ago. This spring is the anniversary of two American wars. 150 years ago this April, the United States finally succeeded in restoring the unity of the country and ending the brutal institution of slavery. Like the apostles, many U.S. soldiers lost their lives in that sacred work. 70 years ago this May, peace returned to Europe after a war in which millions of U.S. and allied soldiers and sailors and marines gave up their lives to free Europe from Nazi tyranny. That work to liberate Europe and restore peace to the world was also both sacred and dangerous work.

So, as you might suspect, I do see a connection between these two holidays - one secular and one religious, one American and one global. We give thanks for the holy work of the Spirit-blessed apostles, and we give thanks for the brave service of those who gave their lives for the unity and freedom of our nation and all its people. Our own church is home to memorials of those at Grace who have served the Gospel and those who have served our nation. To appreciate that latter group, take a look at all the names on the WW I Memorial (on the wall behind the lectern) and the WW II Memorial (on the wall by where we have coffee hour). I have even looked for a Civil War Memorial for the men of the parish who served in that war but haven't yet found anything. Perhaps we can create one someday (there must have been dozens of parishioners who served in that war), but even now, we can give thanks for them and others who have served at the risk of their own well-being and remember the words of our Lord, who said, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." (John 15:13) And we can be inspired to do God's work in the world today through their example.
