



# Spotlight: The Grace Church Seal & Shield - Digitized!

Grace Church is blessed to have many talented and artistically gifted parishioners both in previous generations and today. We would like to extend a special thanks to parishioner William Galligan for digitizing the Grace Church Shield and Seal for our use in various settings. The shield was designed in the late 1940s by parishioner Edna W. Lawrence (1898-1987) and can be found on a number of our High Altar frontals, in a stained glass window in the Narthex and in a wood carving near the Christ Pantokrator icon in the rear of the church. Below is an excerpt from an unpublished 1982 biography of The Rev. Dr. Clarence H. Horner, Rector of Grace Church from 1937 to 1961, that concerns the creation of and the symbols within the Grace Church shield.

"Grace Church never had a heraldic shield. The Rector wanted one and consulted a distinguished artist, incidentally a member, life-long, of our parish. That person was Miss Edna W. Lawrence.



A modest lady, Miss Lawrence taught Art for more than fifty years at the Rhode Island School of Design. She enjoys national and international fame. Asked to make a device for us, Horner furnished the symbolic materials to appear on the shield.

In shape it was ovate, i.e. shaped like an egg but elongated. About one quarter of the area at the top was grey and rippled. This represented the waves of the sea [Rhode Island being known as "the Ocean State"]. In the other three quarters of the ovate, a red cross appears. An Anchor above the Cross represents the State.

This Cross made for four quadrants, tow above the horizontal crossbar and two below. The upper left quadrant was blue or azure. The one on the right was white.

Below the horizontal crossbar the lower area was in white, its right in blue or azure. On the center cross from its top to center were three sea shells secured in a descending order, representing Baptism and the Holy Trinity. On the crossarm, left of center and near the end was a Star representing Bethlehem. Likewise

at the end of the right crossarm was a Jerusalem Cross. Shown on the lower vertical bar of the red center cross from center to bottom was [the shape of one of the large silver chalices that was specifically made for use at Grace Church in 1871].

I have a strong feeling that Dr. Horner wanted to bring into this shield, the Nation, the State, and the Church, with emphasis being given to the two Sacraments ordained by Christ, namely Baptism and the Supper of the Lord. So the Shield was adopted by the Vestry vote of Grace Church with the hope that future clergy would wear the shield on their scarves [tippets]."


# Thursdays @ Noon Concerts Andrew Scanlon, *Organ October 6, 2022*


