### Spotlight: The Pilgrimage of a Lifetime!

Parishioners Ben and Jennifer West spent most of the month of October on a "Cathedral Crawl" pilgrimage they had been hoping to undertake for several years. They travelled by rail from city to city in England visiting several cathedrals. The Wests have kindly written a short summary of their trip and we thought it would be of interest to the wider Grace Church community.

"We had surveyed friends at Grace and the diocese to find out which cathedrals might be most interesting. We really can't say which cathedral was best, as all are grand, with intricate details. Perhaps it was going to Evensong at each one...or maybe the incredible friendliness of the British people. Here are brief observations about each cathedral.



**Durham:** the hospitality was wonderful, and two saints are buried there (<u>St. Cuthbert</u> and the <u>Venerable Bede</u>.)

**York Minster:** High Mass on Sunday morning was stunning, gold gilt was covering everything, and the rare medieval stained glass (the glass at all of the others was Victorian, as Henry VIII had the windows smashed out during the Reformation).

**Ely:** the beautiful painted ceiling and <u>Octagon Tower</u> are captivating. A woman (<u>**St. Etheldreda**</u>) was responsible for its building.

**Canterbury:** impressive because it is the mother church of the Anglican Communion. Half was covered in scaffolding, as there is much on-going reconstruction. The history within the cathedral was overwhelming.

\*Salisbury: The tallest spire of any church in England (404 feet!). A beautiful Sunday morning Eucharist where we were welcomed graciously. A modern baptismal font in the middle of the nave (probably 10 feet in diameter), spoke to the promise for the future.

We attended twelve Evensong services in total: three with all-girl choirs, two with all-boys, and the rest with mixed voices. Some of the pipe organs were incredible (especially York Minister, which just completed a full organ restoration). We came home to Grace Church, were reminded of its beauty, and

realized that our choir is as good or better than any we heard. For Little Rhody we are grand in our own right."

\*As a particular note of interest for the Grace Church community, is that our Choir & Choristers will be undertaking a tour to the UK to sing services at Salisbury Cathedral and Southwark Cathedral in London this coming August! Stay tuned as we provide updates on the trip!
